Rather than adhere to the common law of tort, civil law jurisdictions sustain a unique response to unlawful and intentional harm caused by others, which it calls a delict (in French, the term is *délict*); all directly from the Roman law concept of delict, one of the two great varieties of obligations (the other, contract).
